




BITTER SEEDS

A film by MICHA X. PELED - USA | 2011 | 88' & 57'



Every 30 minutes a farmer in India kills himself in despair because he can no longer provide for his family. Cotton farmer Ramkrishna is at the epicenter of the suicide crisis region and he is struggling to keep his land. Will he be the next one? His neighbor's daughter Manjusha, is determined to overcome village traditions and to become a journalist. She decides that Ramkrishna's plight will be her first assignment. Very dramatically, BITTER SEEDS raises critical questions about the human cost of genetically modified agriculture and the future of how we grow things. This is the third film in Peled's Globalization Trilogy, following the award-winning STORE WARS and CHINA BLUE.

Charles and Ray Eames are widely considered America. Charles and Ray Eames are widely considered America's most important designers. Perhaps best remembered for their plywood and fiberglass furniture, they also created a bewildering variety of other products, from splints for wounded military, to photography, interiors, multi-media exhibits, graphics, games, films and toys. The film draws from a trove of archival material, films and photographs produced in mind-boggling volume by the hyper-creative forty years of their existence.



FOUR HORSEMEN

A film by ROSS ASHCROFT - UK | 2011 | 97' (also in 3x28')



Very timely film about the financial crisis today. Understanding that we will never return to 'business as usual', 23 international experts who have worked at the highest level, break their silence and explain how Human Beings must shift their priorities and to be prepared to have any chance of survival. Looking at America, UK, Pakistan, Goldman Sachs and the fall of the Western Empire, leading personalities join forces to describe how we arrived at such an amoral mess and why there is still hope in re-establishing a moral, human and just society. FOUR HORSEMEN could be seen as the update of the now 10 years old and very successful THE CORPORATION.



GANG RAPE IN PAKISTAN (Fine-Cut)

A film by HABIBA NOSHEEN and HILKE SCHELLMANN - USA / Pakistan | 2012 | 55'



With unprecedented access this gripping film tells the story of 13-year-old Kainat Soomro, who accuses four men of gang rape. The tribal elders to order her murder as the rape has brought shame to the village. But her family refuses to kill her and with their support, she takes her fight to Pakistan's courts. The alleged rapists now face the death penalty and hire Pakistan's top defence attorney to prove their innocence. Kainat 's story shows the extraordinary strength that women like her possess and must have to turn their backs on the tribal traditions demanding justice from a legal system that continues to fail them.

KRISIS: A Greek Tragedy

A film by NIKOS KATSAOUNIS and NINA MARIE PASCHALIDOU - Greece | 2011 | 60'



This very timely documentary is the result of a creative collaboration of 14 photojournalists shooting a collective documentation of a Greece living an ever deepening economic crisis. Starting in an agitated and demonstrating Athens, the journalists went around the country, from the border with Turkey to central Greece and to the inhospitable mountains of southern Crete to collect their stories, exploring how Greece and the Greeks are handling the crisis. **KRISIS** also delves into some of Greece's 20th century history and is not void of self-criticism to explain why Greece is today in the situation it is in.



STEVE JOBS: The Lost Interview

A film by ROBERT CRINGELY, JOHN GAU and PAUL SEN - USA | 1995 / 2011 | 70'



In 1995, during the making of his TV series about the birth of the PC, Bob Cringely did a memorable long interview with Steve Jobs. At the time Jobs was running Next, the niche computer company he had founded after leaving Apple. During the interview, Jobs was witty, outspoken and visionary — a pioneer at the peak of his powers, already anticipating the digital future that one day he would do so much to make possible. Thought lost, the full interview was recently found in the director's garage. There are surprising few filmed interviews with Steve Jobs, and even fewer good ones. So the producers decided to clean this one up to give today's audiences a chance to see Jobs at his charismatic best looking into the future then. A future which is now!



THE ISLAND PRESIDENT

A film by JON SHENK - USA | 2011 | 101', 83' & 56'



President Mohamed Nasheed of the Maldives, dramatically ousted mere weeks ago by his vice-president and forces from the old dictatorship, made the world aware of his problem greater than any other world leader has ever faced—the literal survival of his country and everyone in it. After bringing democracy to the Maldives after 30 years of despotic rule, he realizes that a rise of three feet in sea level would submerge his country, one of the most beautiful archipelagoes in the world, enough to make them uninhabitable. President Nasheed is today no longer president of the Maldives, but he has made a major contribution to the climate change discussion and this is his story.



THE NEXT LIFE

A film by FAN JIAN - China / Japan | 2011 | 81' & 54'



Moving story about a Chinese couple whose eight year-old daughter was killed in the devastating earthquake of 2008, a catastrophe that killed more than 6000 children. Due to China's one-child policy, most of the grieving families were left childless and many couples are planning to have new babies. The wife, Hongmei, deeply wishes for a daughter. She believes that another girl would mean the return of her gone daughter. But being 40 it leaves her in-vitro fertilization as her only option and pregnancy becomes an ordeal for her. Weakening health and financial strains make her second in-vitro fertilization attempt her last, with considerable risks. Can she make it?



THE VOICE OF BURMA

A film by TURID ROGNE - Norway | 2011 | 60'



From exile in Oslo, Norway, the journalists of DVB (Democratic Voice of Burma) have been fighting against one of the worlds worst dictatorships for twenty years. Now in 2012, their country Burma (Myanmar) is finally turning in a democratic direction. The film "The Voice of Burma" portrays the TV-station and their journalists as they broadcast live for the very first time during Burma's controversial election in 2010 and cover the release of democracy-icon Aung San Suu Kyi minute by minute. The film documents a historic period for Burma and is a moving portrait of individuals struggling for a better future for their people and country.



VIRGIN TALES

A film by MIRJAM VON ARX - Switzerland | 2012 | 58' & 87'



The Evangelical Christians are the fastest growing movement within the Christian faith. Their followers are responsible for a fundamental shift in how many people think about sex today. Filmmaker Mirjam von Arx followed the nine members of an American Evangelical family over two years only to discover a booming second sexual revolution: Chastity as a countermovement to the attitudes of the 60s.




WAKING THE GREEN TIGER

A film by GARY MARCUSE - Canada / China | 2011 | 58'



By declaring that nature must be conquered in the name of progress, Mao ushered in an era of environmental degradation for China. In spectacular archival footage (some of it seen outside China for the first time), citizens were mobilized to raze forests and slaughter animals. These rash actions laid waste to ecosystems and triggered a famine that killed tens-of-millions. Now, a new generation of environmentalists composed of activists, journalists, filmmakers and former politicians strives to preserve their natural wonders, educate their compatriots and encourage public debate. Newly emboldened, these once-marginalized citizens become part of a "green hurricane" that's sweeping through China.



WORDS OF WITNESS

A NEW film by MAI ISKANDER ("Garbage Dreams") - USA / Egypt | 2012 | 68'



Every time 22-year-old Heba Afify heads out to cover the historical events shaping her country's future, her mother is compelled to remind her, "I know you are a journalist, but you're still a girl!" Defying cultural norms and family expectations, Heba takes to the streets to report on an Egypt in turmoil, using tweets, texts and Facebook posts. Her coming of age, political awakening and the disillusionment that follows, mirrors that of a nation seeking the freedom to shape its own destiny, dignity and democracy.

FALL 2011 RELEASES

THE CURSE OF THE GOTHIC SYMPHONY A WILD FURY FILM

Said to be cursed for over 80 years, the immense 'Gothic Symphony', written by obscure British composer Havergal Brian in the early 20th century has remained virtually unperformed in its entirety. At over 2 hours long and requiring 2 orchestras, 4 brass bands and 5 full choirs singing 42 parts, this is perhaps not surprising. Can a small group of brave enthusiasts overcome a century old curse to stage the longest, largest and most complex symphony ever composed?

EMPIRE ME A film by **PAUL POET**

Utopia is a dream mankind has long imagined, but the world out there hardly allow alternatives and visions. In spite of all of this hundreds of do-it yourself small nations have build their own little microcosms with real territories and communities. Some of these barely bigger than a sheep farm or a sea platform, thousands of free spirits thus battle since the 90's against the new world order. They create their own laws, languages, stamps and banknotes. The populations range from 1 to 500,000. **EMPIRE ME** encounters some of these counter-worlds which represent the movement at its best.

FACEBOOK FOLLIES: The Unexpected Consequences of the Social Media A film by GEOFF D'EON

A very timely look at the unexpected consequences of people sharing their personal information on social media. Stories about people losing their jobs, their marriages, their dignity, or even ending up in jail - all because of their own or someone else's Facebook posting - are inter-cut with reflections from experts in the areas of social change, internet security and contemporary media.

THE DARK SIDE OF THE SUN A film by CARLO HINTERMANN

This film is the moving account of the lives of a group of children suffering from Xeroderma Pigmentosum, also called XP, at Camp Sundown, a summer camp held in upstate New York children who suffer from XP can gather and play at night, hoping for a normal life. XP is a rare and lethal illness, where the body's ability to repair damage caused by ultraviolet (UV) light is deficient. In extreme cases all exposure to sunlight must be forbidden, no matter how small. Fewer than 40% of individuals with the disease survive beyond age of 20.

G-SPOTTING: A Story of Pleasure and Promise A film by SÉGOLÈNE HANOTAUX, GILLES BOVON and HOWARD GOLDBERG

A joyful and surprising film, filled with colorful characters, exploring science, sexual liberation, ideological conflicts, and of course... pleasure. How, in 2011, can myths still exist around female sexuality? How is it the mere mention of this erotic region provokes such argument, doubt, and even salacious laughter? How can this simple erogenous zone, mysteriously identified as the "G spot", be known to all yet... only very few know its location, its physiology or the story of its discovery?



FALL 2011 RELEASES

GUN FIGHT A NEW film by **BARBARA KOPPLE**

Two-time Oscar-winner Barbara Kopple takes a fresh look at the impact of guns in America through vivid stories of people who have a personal stake in the issue. With an estimated 250 million privately-owned guns in America, about 30,000 people are killed by guns in the U.S. every year, and another 65,000 wounded. A provocative film looking at an unavoidable part of America's image and reality.

INSIDE LARA ROXX A film by MIA DONOVAN

In 2004, 21-year old Lara Roxx left her hometown of Montreal for L.A to try to make money in the porn industry. Within two months she contracted the most virulent form of HIV while performing sex in front of the camera. **INSIDE LARA ROXX** is about the events leading up to that moment and the years after it- it is about the adult movie industry and its impact on a young life.

JUSTICE FOR SALE A film by FEMKE AND ILSE VAN VELZEN - NETHERLANDS

Claudine, a young and courageous human rights lawyer in Congo struggles against injustice and widespread impunity in Congo as she investigates the case of a soldier who was convicted of rape and discovers that his trial was unfair and corrupted. He was convicted without any concrete evidence. In her journey to obtain justice, she uncovers a system where the basic principles of law are virtually ignored.

MOTHER: Caring for 7 Billion A film by CHRISTOPHE FAUCHERE

Unique film that breaks a 40-year taboo by bringing to light an issue that silently fuels our most pressing environmental, humanitarian and social crises - population growth. It is a critical time to talk about this subject as in 2011 the world's population will be seven billion. At the same time, talking about population has become politically incorrect because of the sensitivity of the issues surrounding the topic—religion, economics, family planning and gender inequality. Yet it is an issue we cannot afford to ignore as 1 billion people still suffer from chronic hunger.

OPEN SECRET A film by STEVE LICKTEIG

What if everything you know about yourself is a lie? And everyone in your life around you always knew the truth except you? Adopted at birth, Steve always wondered who his real parents were. One day two best friends had enough and told him shocking news: His parents were actually his natural grandparents and he was the illegitimate son of his oldest sister, Joanie. Now, two decades later, he takes a camera back to Kansas and starts asking questions, a quest leading him to unexpected places. A universal story about family secrets and lies.

SPLIT: A DIVIDED AMERICA A film by KELLY NYKS

The USA is in the grips of a rancorous Democrats/Republicans partisanship the like of which has not been seen in nearly a century. Every political issue today invariably becomes a partisan battle, irrespective of the issue. How has the United States become so divided? **SPLIT** tries find an answer to that question at a time when it is needed most through candid conversations with citizens from all walks of life and commentary from some of the sharpest minds analyzing government and society today.

URBANIZED A film by **GARY HUSTWIT**

Who is allowed to shape our cities, and how do they do it? And how does the design of our cities affect our lives? By exploring a diverse range of urban design projects in dozens of cities around the world, from massive infrastructure initiatives to temporary interventions, **URBANIZED** frames a global discussion on the future of cities. In this final documentary of director Hustwit's design trilogy (Helvetica, Objectified) some of the world's foremost architects, planners, policymakers, and thinkers are sharing their thoughts with us.

UNRAVELED: A Modern Day Tragedy of Ambition Gone Astray A film by MARC H. SIMON

Just days before Bernard Madoff captured world headlines, Marc Dreier, a prominent Manhattan attorney, was arrested for orchestrating a massive fraud scheme that netted almost a billon of dollars. **UNRAVELED** is set in the "purgatory" of house arrest where the Court has ordered Dreier confined until his sentencing day. The film weaves Dreier's struggle to prepare for the possibility of life imprisonment with first-person flashbacks that reveal his audacious path of destruction. Destroyed by his own hubris, Dreier attempts to grasp his tragic unraveling.
